Foreword

The greatest adventure a human being can undertake is the journey from the ego, the "I," to the Self, the divine consciousness that exists within each of us. This most demanding and fulfilling journey takes us from a world of separation, governed by the ego's fears, anxieties and desires, into the experience of divine unity, the oneness, peace and harmony that belong to the core of our being. It is a radical shift in consciousness that unfolds gradually within the traveler, helped by spiritual teachings, practices, and above all the grace that is given. Traditionally it is described as a turning away from the illusions of the outer world of the senses, to discover the deeper truth that is within us. In the Sufi tradition it is a "turning of the heart" that reveals the truth of divine love that is veiled by the illusions of the ego and our lower nature. Traveling the path these veils are gradually lifted, and we awake in the sunshine of the Self, in the wholeness of our divine consciousness.

The outer world is initially seen as a place of illusion that distracts us from this quest. And the spiritual seeker often has to make an intense effort to become free of these illusions, free of the grip of the ego and the desires of our lower nature. We work hard to free our self from the many attachments, the conscious and unconscious patterns that imprison us. But Sufism has revealed a deeper truth that the illusions of the outer world can also be read as signposts on the journey Home. God, the Beloved, is hidden in the depths of our heart, and for the mystic is an unknowable Essence. But in the outer world He manifests Himself in all the multiplicity of existence. The outer world is a reflection or manifestation of divine Truth. To quote the great Sufi, Ibn 'Arabi:

How can I know You when You are the Inwardly Hidden who is not known?

How can I not know You when You are the Outwardly manifest, making Yourself known to me in everything?¹

The challenge presented by *101 Helpful Illusions* is how to use the illusions of the outer world as guidance along the path without being trapped in its distortions and distractions. How can the multiplicity of creation lead us back to the unity of the Self, the truth of our divine nature?

For the spiritual traveler, one of the most important qualities to learn is spiritual discrimination: how to differentiate what belongs to the ego and what belongs to the Self. The Self is waiting and wanting to help us on this journey of liberation, but we have to learn how to listen to its voice, how to know when it is guiding us rather than the deceptive voices of the ego and the mind. If we can read this book with real receptivity, we will find the wisdom of one who has already made this journey and can help the traveler. Shaykh Fadhlalla Haeri speaks with the wisdom and understanding of one who has seen through the world's illusions, but rather than just dismiss them as obstacles, guides us into a deeper understanding of how they can help us. This is the real value of this book.

Today we live in a civilization where it is not easy to turn away from the world. On every side we are bombarded by a thousand images designed to distract us. The work of the traveler is not to find a place of isolation, to separate himself from the world, but to continue the journey amidst all of these distractions. It is so easy to get lost in the maze of life's illusions. It is the art of a master to be able to use these illusions as signposts on the journey, as a way to develop, or reconnect with the pure consciousness of the Self. Life has real lessons to teach us, from the patterns and flow imaged in nature, to recognizing and differentiating between the needs of the ego and the needs of the soul. But without understanding life's signs, we pass by, blinded by our own limitations and conditioning.

Shaykh Fadhlalla Haeri explores the illusions of the natural world, and the human illusions that we find in relationships with its many projections, also the addictions and collective patterns that determine our values and ways of behaving. And always we are shown how real understanding can free us from their grip and help us to realize the unity of a deeper consciousness. Through these apparent paradoxes we can grow towards this light that is within us, begin to claim what is real. We are even made aware of the higher illusions of spiritual life, which so easily waylay the traveler. Rather than projecting our wisdom and spiritual qualities on others, we are reminded of the sacred treasure within our own heart. The Sufi says that the outer teacher always points to the

Introduction

We all love to discover rare gems or treasures in life. The human soul (or spirit) is the supreme treasure, hidden and veiled by the ego – the self.

The essence of human nature is an eternal light within the inner heart – a super consciousness called spirit, or soul. This soul is like a sacred hologram that bears desirable attributes and qualities considered universally virtuous and which give rise to human morality. But this intangible soul also gives rise to its shadow companion, the individual self or ego, which grows and evolves towards the recognition and knowledge of the soul and eventually to union with it. Personal individual consciousness is conditioned and is derived from the soul's consciousness which replicates pure or supreme consciousness. Thus it can be said that every soul is a flash of the cosmic soul or God and overflows with attributes of the sacred essence.

The duality of self and soul within the human being echoes all existential pluralities and complementary opposites: the outer and inner, form and meaning, earth and heavens, seen and unseen, good and bad, birth and death, easy and difficult and numerous other states within our inner make up. All of these opposites and dualities are experienced by us and are mirrored in the outer world. Thus the human being is a microcosm resonating with the macrocosm, and reflects the unifying field and one reality or truth that holds the universal realities.

Consciousness has numerous levels and spheres. Lower consciousness is basic and life giving. This gives rise to a local, conditioned and personal awareness to animated creatures. Higher consciousness, however, is exclusive to human beings. This is often called pure, divine, supreme or God-consciousness. Lower consciousness is an aspect of higher consciousness and is dependent upon it.

Conditioned human consciousness evolves with age and wisdom, towards higher levels until there is unison between the self (ego) and soul, through the inner heart. This unified consciousness is sometimes called enlightenment or spiritual awakening. The human soul is like a sacred spark representing the cosmic soul or God within the human kingdom of body, mind and intellect.

The human journey and growth is both physical as well as spiritual. The physical or biological part is governed to a great extent by genes, as well as the environment. Spiritual growth follows alongside physiological and psychological maturity. Self-realization or enlightenment brings about personal contentment, peace and joy without negating the ever-changing outer realities.

Life's journey is an adventure to discover inner and outer perfection and then to discern true goodness in every situation. The purpose of all worldly challenges is to discover the everpresent sacred essence that permeates the universe through knowledge of the soul within our heart. Terms like 'humanity', 'unity' and even mundane 'relationships' reflect different levels of the unique Oneness of the cosmic essence, which manifests and appears as diverse dualities and pluralities, gross and subtle.

Space-time is the nursery wherein all possible creations occur and manifest as interaction between energy and matter in a natural cyclical fashion, with births and deaths signifying beginnings and ends of particular events. This nursery provides local and broader boundaries so that entities experience individuality due to conditioned consciousness relating to survival, growth and ongoingness. This is the cause of egotistic conduct for survival and growth.

This basic level of consciousness appears as separate from higher consciousness due to the self delusion of its independence and willfulness. However, human beings have the potential to transcend to a higher soul consciousness where self and soul are in unison and end the illusion of separation and confinement of space to time. This breakthrough leads to the realization of cosmic unity and eternal oneness in essence, which permeates the universe.

There are two levels of human evolution and growth. One involves physical and mental maturity with the development of certain uniqueness about each individual. The second level is spiritual evolvement and the realization of higher consciousness, and the falsehood of all earthly events and experiences which are initially helpful for survival, but become barriers to soul consciousness and thereby lasting relief and contentment.

The human drive for wellbeing, harmony and happiness and avoidance of sickness, discord and misery can be a great force to realize the source and essence of life – the free and joyful soul within. The human soul is ever-free, content and stable, and is not subject to the changing world of duality, insecurity and uncertainty experienced by the ego-self.

What starts as a selfish, egocentric and conditioned but evolving personality is in fact necessary for our early development but becomes an obstacle and handicap with regard to higher consciousness and liberation from all worldly mental boundaries. We spend the first half of our life learning skills to act, gather and achieve outer objectives. This process is a prelude to the wisdom that success and failure are never separate and that pleasure and pain are twin companions, appearing as opposites. Mind and intellect become sharp and focused but the 'soulmate vacancy' may persist. Through spiritual wisdom the self will eventually learn to submit to the soul and thereby rest in perfect unison and contentment. This state represents the final purpose of human life.

In truth, the self and soul are never separate except that the ego is acting as the shadow companion of the soul, desiring all the soul's qualities and blissful state, but is distracted by the illusion of its independence as a separate and worthy entity.

Self delusions are the result of the illusion that the self is real on its own and is free of the soul. Until the self discovers its own resident master within the heart it remains restless and hapless – moving from one delusion to another. Anger, disappointment, denial and other so-called 'negative' emotions are due to the self being distracted from yielding to soul attraction and the original primal addiction to it. The soul is broadcasting its unconditional love to the self, which avoids acknowledgement of its dependence upon the soul. Self importance, distractions and the ever-changing roles and identities continue until at last, through shocks and divine grace, it may surrender and awaken to this sacred call and embrace. This is the union worth celebrating on earth whose decree was written in heaven.

A spiritually insightful person will discover that all so-called faults, vices or negative traits belong to the ego-self while all perfection and virtues are attributes of the soul; and it is these higher qualities and ideals that have been beckoning us all along. Guilt and neglect arise due to

the discrepancy between what a person *could* have done and what was *actually* done. Mistakes occur due to the lack of self awareness or presence of mind and heart at the time of action. This is why an apologetic person may say 'I was beside myself', or 'it wasn't really me who did that' or 'I don't know what came over me'. So who is the real 'me'? A better version than the usual! A self that refers to the soul?!

The restless self may fall through to greater distraction, confusion and self-delusion or surrender to a more harmonious and wholesome state by sensitive understanding of the signs of the soul. This state of heartful awareness of the 'higher self ', or consciousness, is a natural state as the soul is the essence of life.

If illusions cause the seeker of truth to suffer then it is a healthy warning to retract from inappropriateness and to refocus and follow the illumined map leading to inner liberty and harmony. Vices can be keys to virtues and illusions can lead towards illumined conclusions.

To recognize personal illusions, traps and biases and to go beyond them is the necessary step towards awakening to the ever-present truth and bliss. This outcome is what we describe as a fulfilled life. What was early on a selfish act justified as intelligent self-interest is now replaced with 'soul' interest – far more durable and reliable. Enlightenment is the outcome of an evolution from basic personal need for survival and growth to pure consciousness. It is a metamorphosis from the dark cocoon of delusion to the ever-present garden of light and delight.

Chapter 1: Natural Illusions

Nature can be deceptive in many ways and at different levels of subtlety or obviousness. Rainbow colors appear to reveal the vibrant components of light, yet there is a far broader range of frequencies and wavelengths in light than we can visibly discern. The common assumption is that light is what enables us to see; the rest of the story eludes us. For example, birds have learned many ways to distract potential threats from their nests. Often the male bird acts as a decoy while the female lays still on the eggs, blending in with her surroundings, a trick which gives birds an advantage in order to survive. In fact, nature is full of deceptions and illusions.

Consciousness is the foundation of life that connects the unseen with the seen through light. Without light there would be no energy or the physical world. Our apparent world hides numerous levels of subtler forces, which are barely discernible or describable. Logic and causality are keys in describing what appears to us as real, but what is not apparent is of much greater magnitude, like the bulk of the hidden iceberg.

Consciousness is subtler than light and is at the root of existence and creation. There are countless ways of looking at consciousness and differentiating between its levels, spheres and spectrums. Two spheres stand out clearly, however. First is the basic level that makes human beings sentient and alive. This basic consciousness is the face behind the will to survive, grow, replicate, and so on. All living entities are energized by this consciousness. Human beings are distinct from other creatures due to a greater sphere of consciousness, which is higher consciousness, god-consciousness, supreme consciousness or soul consciousness. To this level belong all higher attributes and virtues such as mercy, generosity, forgiveness and others. Human ethics and morality evolve due to higher consciousness.

To be like an animal at first is quite natural, but not to evolve and realize higher consciousness signifies an unfulfilled life. Every creation reaches its appropriate destiny when its highest potential (in terms of consciousness) is accomplished. God is the essence of universal supreme consciousness.

For a child it is natural and normal to be selfish and concerned mostly with its own physical sensory needs. With maturity comes the quest for a sustainable fulfilled life. The lights of higher consciousness begin to supersede the early 'survival' consciousness. To remain mainly bound to conditioned consciousness is to be deprived of awakening to the one real potential of soul essence. Our animalistic state of existence reinforces itself through multiple delusions, veils and worldly distractions, which divert us from accessing soul-consciousness.

If we look closely at all paradoxes and illusions, we see that they were in fact appropriate for us at a particular time or situation in this world, like the shell that protects the kernel of a nut. That is why it is said that there is goodness in everything that exists – if only we look with the eye of spiritual discernment. It is context and specific causality that needs to be viewed. A poison can kill and can cure. Egotism is essential in a child but out of season in a grown up and even detrimental.

Everything in nature reveals some aspects of itself and hides others. Everything earthly has also a heavenly aspect and every lie betrays an aspect of truth. To progress spiritually we need to witness naturally occurring illusions, assumptions and fallacies and break past them to the essence that is eternally constant and perfect.

Natural Illusions: 1. Survival

Most animals, insects and other creatures use various ways of camouflage and deception to maximize their survival.

The survival instinct is paramount in all creation. The soul does not die and every self echoes that state. Life continues and every entity with a limited lifespan seeks longevity.

Natural Illusions: 2. Ongoing Evolution

Just as biological evolution continues, so does consciousness.

Evolution is an endless process from unity via everythingness back to singularity. Natural physiological growth is accompanied by the growth of mind and consciousness.

Natural Illusions: 3. Blind Spots

In nature, diversity and duality create a complex interactive world not easy to grasp as a whole. Thus, we focus on a particular direction and thereby miss many points along the way.

Realities are often masked by human emotions. A youngster in love will not see faults in the object of his affections.

Natural Illusions: 4. Extending Boundaries

Within microbes, plants and animals the urge to procreate and extend personal and species domain is clearly evident.

The soul is boundless and every self or ego desires to occupy and dominate the earth, hence the plethora of species spread all over the earth.

Natural Illusions: 5. Respect of Age and Distance

Long periods of time or distance, such as historical events or inaccessible mountain tops, seem to acquire the patina of sacredness.

The human soul originates from beyond space and time thus the self desires to be liberated from the restrictions of space and time and yet respect them.

Natural Illusions: 6. Work in Progress

There is no meaningful finality or end to life since everything is in flux and subject to change. Yet we always look for closure and completion.

The soul is beyond space and time whilst the self on earth is on a quest for the permanent.

Natural Illusions: 7. Sensory Illusions

All of our senses are subject to false prescriptions. Some of these include optical illusions such as the famous Kanizsa triangle, or auditory illusions in which an imaginary sound is heard, or tactile illusions such as phantom limbs. Why can't our senses always be true?

The soul does not see or hear; it just knows the truth. The self, comprising body, mind, intellect and heart, is being led to truth as known to the soul. During this process of evolvement, errors and faults are natural.

Natural Illusions: 8. Eternal Life

We know that life doesn't end with personal death, yet we fear and regret death and consider it a calamity instead of a natural step forward.

The self is born into a world of space/time and acts as a veil to the eternal soul. With the realization of the sacred soul's presence, an enlightened person is liberated from the fear of death. There is only perpetual life in this world and beyond.

Natural Illusions: 9. Orderly Chaos

With wisdom and science we discover order in every situation and event. With self knowledge, we also discover the reason behind physical and emotional chaos and confusion.

The soul is eternally in its perfect state and when the self focuses on higher consciousness and beyond limited identifications, it experiences harmony and contentment.

Natural Illusions: 10. Seeking the Uncommon

It is a natural human tendency to seek and explore beyond the boundaries of the common and the familiar. The unknown on earth and beyond holds a strong fascination.

The restless self is in constant search for the boundless and absolute – the soul within. In the meantime, it follows the familiar pursuit of exploring the outer worlds!

Natural Illusions: 11. Universal Symmetry

Everything in nature has its complementary or symmetrical opposite. There is no shadow without light, no inner without outer, no beginning without end.

Reflections and mirror-imaging are aspects of complementary duality. Eternal oneness has brought about natural diversity and two-ness, all of which point to their singular essence – One and Only One – every other illusion of special or independent oneness is merely echoing the truth of the sacred One.

Chapter 2: Personal Illusions

Life's numerous paradoxes, enigmas and apparent contradictions can be resolved when we consider the human being as a balanced composition between the self (conditioned basic consciousness) and a soul (pure consciousness). We may feel secure and content regarding an aspect of our life and yet at the same time apprehensive or insecure regarding something else. Even when one feels upbeat and happy there lurks a shade of sadness, due to the temporariness of this state. There is a subconscious fear of loss of the pleasurable moment as we have already experienced previous mood swings. No 'mental' state or feelings is ever lost. The swing between contentment and the desires continue.

Normal day-to-day human life contains countless illusions partly sensed and partly imagined or anticipated. The so-called 'real' life experiences are a result of a combination of subjective and objective factors, which in fact include fears, fantasies and wishful thinking. The ever-changing state of personal consciousness is dependent upon pure consciousness that permeates all existence. This sphere of constancy and wholeness engulfs and energizes all lesser levels of consciousness.

Conditioned consciousness drives us to pursue whatever ensures survival, strength and growth and a host of other earthly needs. We naturally delude ourselves into pursuing extra desires and ideas superfluous to survival and basic stability. For example, love for wealth or power may relate to satisfying needs for physical survival and social status up to a point. Similarly body chemistry drives us towards sexual gratification and procreation but it often becomes a means to stimulate mental 'reward' chemistry. Through the power of hunger we are driven to act and know how and where to discover food and shelter. Ultimately, the drive to satisfy worldly needs leads to higher and subtler states of harmony and wellbeing at the levels of body, mind and heart.

Spiritual wisdom is the realization that on its own the self/ego can never attain perfection or happiness. It is by transcending all illusions and so-called realities that we awaken to the everpresent Real. When the outer challenges lead to inner transformation, the joys of unity overflow beyond all that is seen and unseen.

Personal Illusions: 12. Good or Bad Character

We tend to glibly label people as good, bad, brilliant or mediocre. In truth, there is no rigid personality, only changing traits, habits and behavior.

The soul is always perfect and everyone strives towards perfection with varying degrees of consciousness of the soul that succeeds or fails – good or bad.

Personal Illusions: 13. Guardian Angels

Many people believe they are protected by angels who guide and help. The idea of connection with the unseen realm has been with us from time immemorial! It seems we need this notion.

Intuition and subtle guidance occur reliably due to the purified self, which receives the soul's signals and light. The human soul is higher than all angels. The soul within the heart is not only the guardian and guide; it is the source of life.

Personal Illusions: 14. Wealth and Poverty

Sometimes we may have outer wealth but feel inwardly impoverished and vice versa. More is not always better. Sometimes less is more!

If inner wealth is consistent then outer wealth or poverty hardly matter. The soul is beyond all measure of wealth and does not have an 'outer' or 'inner'. It is pure, unified light, and the self desperately seeks that.

Personal Illusions: 15. Impartiality

Can we be objective, factual and unbiased in our experiences? No two people can relay facts about an event in exactly the same way.

The self and mind cannot be totally impartial or objective as there is no total separation between objectivity and subjectivity as they are perpetually relative. All experiences are based on relating the outer situation with the inner emotions and mental states.

Personal Illusions: 16. Free Gifts

We enjoy receiving free gifts and winning the lottery. The self is always gratified with easy and free living.

Because the soul flows freely along perfectly and effortlessly, the self desires this state.

Personal Illusions: 17. Surprise and Sameness

We enjoy pleasant surprises as well as the familiar and expected.

The self is very restless and seeks stimulation as well as calm and peace. The treasure of the inner soul is what it really searches for. All other pleasant surprises are short-lived.

Personal Illusions: 18. Justification and Blame

It is a natural tendency to desire and expect whatever we consider acceptable and good and blame others for unrealized expectations.

The soul is ever-perfect and the self is like a shadow desiring perfection, which can only be attained by perfect submission to the inner master.

Personal Illusions: 19. Perfect Destiny, Here and Now

We all desire to experience goodness now and in the future. We are always concerned about our destiny. But how can we ever be secure, sure and content?

'Perfect destiny' implies wellbeing and joy on a continuous basis. That state of bliss is also present now within the soul but we need to tune in to it. Disharmony in body or mind is the barrier to this state.

Personal Illusions: 20. Flexible Self-Interest

All intentions and actions relate to self-interest – the lowest level of ego to the highest of selflessness.

Childish self-interest makes the ego grow. Wise self-interest indicates turning away from selfishness to 'soulfulness'.

Personal Illusions: 21. Appearances

Most of us like to look good and wrinkle-free and yet it's a losing battle against nature.

The self wishes to appear as best as it can, in imitation of the soul – the ever-perfect. The purpose is the kernel, not the shell.

Personal Illusions: 22. Youthfully Old

Most children prefer to be considered older than their age but the reverse is true of older people!

The self desires perpetuity which is a characteristic of the soul.

Personal Illusions: 23. The Self as Schrödinger's Cat

Sometimes one feels alive beyond limits. At other times one is as good as dead. Are you alive or dead?

Ask the cat. The self is closer to death the moment it is born and the soul is ever-alive, so one is both alive and dead. An aspect of you is ever living, and another is dying.

Personal Illusions: 24. Am I Needed?

We delude ourselves with justifications such as: 'they need me',

'I still have so much to do', 'there is still hope', 'I must not fail',

'I have a reputation to maintain', 'I have a duty', 'I can't let them down' and so on.

The very survival of the self and its evolvement depends on the above illusions. Life itself is eternally assured by the soul. And if the self and its activities and duties do not lead it to realize that the master was the eternal soul, then it will surely experience disappointment, irrespective of the outer success of the project.

Personal Illusions: 25. Selflessness

Most human cultures and religions respect and honor acts of self-sacrifice and altruism. How can we reconcile love of the self with giving it up?

Initially the only love one knows is for the lower self. With evolvement of consciousness, we transcend identification with the body and mind and relate to the soul – thus selflessness.

Personal Illusions: 26. Extreme Sport

Skydiving, bungee jumping, fear factor antics – it's a natural tendency to push the self to the edge.

The self is never content with worldly limitations, physical or otherwise. Relief and liberation will only be experienced when the self goes beyond all mental boundaries to the boundless soul.

Personal Illusions: 27. Great Trophies

Prizes, cups and trophies – from childhood we seek acknowledgement. We encourage this trait even though it builds the ego.

The soul has all the prizes worth having and the self aims for this. During the early stages of our development we encourage the self/ego towards excellence. Wisdom will show us that the ultimate and perfect trophy lies within the heart. It is the soul that contains all the perfect qualities and prized traits.

Personal Illusions: 28. Ever the Same

As a child, you use 'I' to describe yourself. In old age you use the same pronoun. Are you still the same?

Human beings are composed of an ever-changing self (body/mind/intellect) and a constant soul, which gives rise to the sense of sameness.

Personal Illusions: 29. Dual Nature

Adventure vs. safety, the familiar vs. the unknown, accord vs. discord, love vs. hate, positive vs. negative, generous vs. mean – we exhibit infinite patterns of contradictions.

Whenever our thoughts and reflections are trapped within the limitations of the self and ego we are deprived of the energizing and positive qualities of the soul. The self is simply the dark side of all the great qualities of soul.

Personal Illusions: 30. The Double-Edged Sword

We all struggle towards the good, and yet experientially we know whatever goodness exists often exists alongside its opposite.

Nature's knife is sharp on both edges. In this life everything is relative and changeable. Perfect goodness belongs to the soul.

Personal Illusions: 31. Gender Superiority

Many men feel superior to women and equally many women may feel superior to most men. Who is greater then?

Each sex complements the other and evolves towards a higher state of wholesomeness and inner realization. Everything in life is in twos and oneness is the source behind all these dualities. Superiority can only mean ease of return to the One.
